





The Florida Keys. Early 1990s.


An inspirational story based on the life of Joe Hoagland, who at six years old, during his third open heart surgery, suffered a complete right-hemisphere stroke, which paralyzed the left side of his body.

The medical field had ruled him out until in 1990, his mother brought him to a dolphin research facility in the Florida Keys. As they walked down to the dock, a certain bottle-nosed dolphin beelined straight to Joe, popped out of the water and squeaked in Joe's little face, and for the first time in a year... he laughed.



SYNOPSIS CONTINUED

Over the next year and a half, his mother, Deena would use Joe's enthusiasm towards his new best friend to motivate him to use his body. She explained that Fonzi was a left-handed dolphin, and that in order to play with him, Joe would have to use his paralyzed left hand to feed him. That night, Deena found Joe alone in his room speaking to his hand, urging it to open and close. A year later Joe was fully recovered.

As Joe began attaining results, the facility couldn't afford the expense of the dolphins and they were going to be shipped off to become show animals. This was not acceptable to Deena, and regardless of the hundreds of thousands of dollars they owed for Joe's hospital bills, Deena found an answer.

Through gracious benefactors, Deena raised the money to acquire the dolphins and launch Island Dolphin Care, a non-profit organization where the Hoagland Family has worked since 1997 developing programs stimulated by the healing process that came about through Joe & Fonzi.

This work has grown into a form of therapy that is now practiced throughout the world, where dolphins work with kids with mental and physical disabilities, as well as, war veterans suffering PTSD, bringing overwhelming results.

Fonzi & Joe continued working together, bringing joy to thousands of children and families over the next decade until thirteen years after their meeting, Fonzi passed away. During a necropsy it was discovered that Fonzi's heart had a very similar defect as Joe's did.
